2014 Hjghlights

The 150th Anniversary:

- FoWB partnered with the NPS for volunteer resources and activities during the commemorative programs
- FoWB sponsored two two-day guided bus tours related to the 1864 Winter Encampment and the Battle of the Wilderness
- FoWB also sponsored a special day of activities at Ellwood in commemoration of the Battle

General Projects:

- The Brooder Barn Project: FoWB elected to partner with the NPS in the rehabilitation of the Brooder Barn. Much like the partnership that restored Ellwood, FoWB has agreed to fund the costs and supply significant volunteer resources where applicable.
- FoWB also funded the removal of the non-historic granary, the reconditioning of that site and the refurbishing of the parking area with new fence rails.

The BRC Committee: Battlefield and surrounds:

- Hosted the Annual Spring Park Day: 2 battlefields; 200+ volunteers; 600 volunteer hours
- Maintained the grounds at Ellwood in pristine condition with volunteers on the FoWB Ellwood Ground Force
- Performed major work on the Brooder Barn Project with volunteers on the Ground Force and two Eagle Scout Projects

The Ellwood Season:

- 46 trained interpreters
- 7,543 visitors and donations of \$5,947.15
- Extended hours included daily April 12 August 17 and weekends and holidays thru Oct. 26
- 12 special events and 14 special tours

Membership:

- The Committee established a new and hopefully more user-friendly notification process
- Successful in its outreach to members, old and new, has seen a small but steady growth in "friends."

Heritage Program:

• Developed a Heritage Brochure and collaborated with Outreach to distribute

Volunteers:

- More than 9,000 hours were contributed byhterpreters, Ground Force, Battlefield Volunteers, Board of Directors, Event participants and other special activities.
- A special incentive program for volunteers was initiated by FoWB under the direction of the Ellwood Committee. The intention is to provide all FoWB volunteers with special opportunities to enjoy tours and lectures as a way of saying "thank you" for their service.

Preservation, Outreach and Community Projects:

- The voice for preservation continues to maintain a presence and partnership with Orange County officials and business leaders as the task of developing the Route 3 Corridor progresses with what we hope will be mutually beneficial balance.
- The Rapidan River Project, with its eye toward improved public access and the enhancement of the Rapidan River splendid assets, is being carried forward with vigor by a dedicated group of enthusiasts.
- FoWB has reached an agreement with the VDHR to function as stewards of the Woodville Tract (former site sought by Walmart) now the property of the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- Under the initial leadership of FoWB, the idea of a "temporary" Welcome Center to be located at the Wildernesshtersection was launched and will be brought back for further discussion for 2015.
- FoWB along with Wealth Perseveres and the Germanna Foundation hosted the 3rd very successful Orange County Chamber of Commerce "Business After Hours"
- The Communications Committee engaged in four *off* site outreach activities in Orange County, providing literature tdDOs of potential new supporters.
- FoWB continues to work with other organizations to promote the Wilderness area as a destination for lovers of all kind of history (Indian, Colonial, Rapidan River based, Gold Mining) anchored by the significant presence of the Wilderness Battlefield Park and the greater Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park.

Special Note:

FoWB wishes to recognize the contributions of volunteers Gerry Culver and Diane Logan, and Howard Lambert and look forward to the opportunity when once again their talents may be utilized for the greater good of the battlefield.

Ellwood's 17th season of being open to the public began on April 12th and ended on October 26th. Weekend and holiday openings began on April 12th through April 27th. Daily openings began April 28th until August 17th when weekend and holiday openings again took effect through Oct. 26th.

Visitation for the 2014 season totaled 7543. Donations totaled \$5947.15.

Battlefield Resources Committee 2014 Annual Report

The purpose of the Battlefield Resources Committee (BRC)is to provide resources and manpower to the National Park Service for the physical maintenance and upkeep of the Wilderness Battlefield portion of the Fredericksburg Spotsylvania National Military Park (FSNMP), helping to provide an enhanced experience for visitors to the battlefield.

FoWB through the BRC continued to accomplish some significant projects for the National Park Service. Two Eagle projects were completed and the BRC conducted a spring and fall Park Day clean-up event. h the spring, the Wilderness and Spotsylvania Court House Battlefields were spruced up in preparation of the Sesquicentennial events.h the fall, (event held on 1 Nov, after this report was prepared), the Wilderness Battlefield was cleaned up in preparation for winter. ,The Brooder Barn restoration project, started in the fall of 2013, is still ongoing but expected to be finished this winter. Upon completion, there will be a fully plumbed public bathroom on the northeast corner of the building and the BRC will have a brand new much larger maintenance facility. Upon completion, the small maintenance garage across the driveway will be torn down.

Ellwood Ground Force (EGF)

This was the first year that the EGF was part of the BRC. There have been no changes in the outstanding weekly upkeep the EGF provides to the Ellwood grounds. This year there was a lot of effort to prepare the grounds in advance of the Sesquicentennial events. As the 2014 Ellwood season starts drawing to a close, one noteworthy fact is the number of new EGF volunteers that joined us in 2014 and the tasks they completed besides their normal duties:

- New "worm fence" installed for parking area.
- Preparing for 1soth_EGF removed significant overgrowth all around the Brooder barn to improve the view-shed and enable the scouts unobstructed access to the outside walls.
- GF and FoWB members tore out old wiring and old wooden walls. The old water pipes and electrical junction box inside were also removed in preparation for the new floor and wiring.

A hearty thanks to the ground force for all their hard work behind the scenes this year! This winter will be spent moving into and upgrading the new spacious Brooder Barn.

Brooder Barn-Eagle Candidate Ty Rivard-BSA Troop 948

This project was integral to the Ellwood Brooder Barn restoration. FoWB funded Ty's project, it consisted of removal of at least a decade's worth of debris from barn, window

removal and installation, and external walls pressure cleaning and multiple coats of painting. Ty started in November 2013 and completed his project in October 2014. Total volunteer time to complete this project-136 **hours.**

Brooder Barn- Eagle Candidate lan Shampine-BSA Troop 791

This project, also funded by FoWB was tied closely to the other one an could not start until the roof was done in May.an's project consisted of painting the fascia board, installing 120 feet of screen along each side of the roof to close the soffits from critter access, paint and install a wood soffit on the north face of brooder barn, and then install 120 feet of rain gutters and 2 down scouts. Total volunteer time to complete this project-88 hours.

Spring Park Day-05 Apr- Wilderness, Spotsylvania Ct. house Battlefields

Park Day, a nationally sponsored event by the Civil War Trust and The History Channel was once again a huge success. The focus this year was on the two FSNMP battlefields that were part of the 2014 Sesquicentennial event. Accomplishments consisted of over 600 volunteer man-hours, ~105 garbage bags of trash removed, painting, monuments cleaned, debris & brush removed.

Below is short summary of what was accomplished :

- Wilderness Site-105 volunteers, >90 bags garbage removed, bollards painted, CCC compound completely cleaned of debris and leaves, Sanders field visitor shelter area cleaned up, 66% of Hill-Ewell 10-yarded, Longstreet & Vermont pulloffs cleaned up, all monuments raked and spruced up.
- Spotsylvania C.H.-100 volunteers, > 15 bags of trash cleared from 1.5 mile section of Brock Rd., gate & main sign at visitor shelter painted, bollards at Anderson triangle, signs throughout park and back gate painted, entire park 10 yarded, assisted NPS with wood cut up and removal.

Medical Tent Upgrade

The medical tent was purchased without poles a few years ago. The manufacturer instructions showed poles fabricated out of 2x4s and other hardware. During high wind conditions at the Ellwood 150th activities in May, the main beam broke collapsing the tent. Luckily, there were no injuries. The BRC found a company in NH that custom fabricates authentic wooden poles and the FoWB Board of Directors approved the purchase. The new poles were used during the September Taming the Wilderness event with no problems and for future events the tent can be used safely.

Wilderness and Spotsylvania C.H. Sesquicentennial Reenactment Event

FoWB supported this Spotsylvania County sponsored event. Mark Wakeman coordinated all volunteers and thanks needs to go out to the FoWB members that also volunteered to work at this 4-day event.

Fall Park Day-1 November

The focus of this event is trash pickup in the Wilderness Battlefield.

The BEC has had a busy, productive year. Its major activities are as follows:

- Facilitated the Board's February retreat where annual plans were discussed and rules for Board conduct were formulated.
- Drafted and brought to the Board for its review two critical governing documents:
 1. A Board of Directors Code of Conduct policy and Procedures for consideration of any formal complaint regarding a Board member's actions.
 2. The Role of Committees and Enhancement Guidelines
- Conducted a comprehensive review of the organization's bylaws and developed amendments for Board consideration to strengthen them.
- Reviewed the status of artifacts loaned or donated to FoWB and recommended that FoWB not engage any kind of artifact loan or acquisition activity.

2014 Activities:

Web Site, E-Blasts and Social Media

- The FoWB Facebook page has accumulated more than 300 likes since it was launched two years ago. We employ an 'organic' approach to increasing views of the site. Rather than pay Facebook to promote our site, we rely on personal networking with visitors and groups such as the Orange and Spotsylvania tourism and chamber groups.
- 'Constant Contact' continues to be FoWB's our primary electronic outreach tool. Attractively formatted general interest E-Blasts are routinely sent to nearly 600 recipients who have signed up for the electronic mailing list. The application is also used for targeted mailings to local residents and FoWB members.
- The web site continues to be improved to provide more information to prospective visitors to Ellwood and the Wilderness Battlefield as well as FoWB members and volunteers. Some examples:
 - A video overview of Ellwood and FoWB's partnership with NPS was added to the home page. The video was funded by the Ellwood Committee. Additional NPS videos were added to the Wilderness Battle pages.
 - Wilderness Brigade and Ellwood Legacy biography stories were added.
 - Created online information pages and online registration forms for Park Day and the bus tours. Added photos from Park Day.

Publications

- Wilderness Battlefield/Ellwood Rack Cards displayed at various visitor center, hotels and other tourism sites in the area.
- A new FoWB general information tri-fold brochure is in development and is planned to be distributed beginning in the spring of 2015. The brochure will feature information on the organization, volunteer opportunities, membership and the Heritage Program.

Outreach and Promotion

- A dedicated and energized group of volunteers spent countless hours preparing for and conducting a number of public outreach booths. Kudos to Beth Stenstrom, George Smith, Ann and Carl Bayer, Milbrey Bartholow, Mike and Linda Pierce and Shirley and Gordon Rowe!
- Outreach booths were presented at: Orange Street Festival, Gordonsville Street Festival, Orange Business Expo, Lake of the Woods Fourth of July Festival and a number of events at Ellwood. While we don't have an estimate for the total number of folks that we visited with ... The estimated count for the two street festivals was more than 1300!
- Promotional handouts and givea way items were distributed at all events.

Heritage Program Committee 2014 Annual Report

During 2014 the Heritage Program Committee increased from four to six persons. This was due to the anticipated growth in number of members, especially generated from the 15oth Overland Campaign Anniversary.

Currently, the committee is working on 9 applications. hcreases have stemmed from names that were received from the Spotsylvania tourism director. Transferal of names came from a list generated during Spotsylvania's participation in the 15oth anniversary festivities.

The Heritage Program was well represented at Ellwood during the 15oth, featuring a Heritage tent with committee members assisting visitors with queries and providing valuable information on the "how- tos and whys" of joining. Current members could personally tell their ancestor's stories and be videotaped. The videos are for use on the FoWB website.

The special offer of a \$50.00 donation which includes a \$20.00 level of membership for a year, has been extended from December of 2014 to indefinitely. The \$50.00 still includes a frameable certificate, a packet containing items related to the battle, such as the FoWB pin and ribbon and a FoWB hat, the member's family tree and ancestor's personal story. Copies of the HP member's ancestor's personal story and their family tree occupy a permanent place in the Heritage Program books on display at Ellwood.

Recognition of new members is done at the annual meeting. Existing members are also remembered.

The Heritage Program currently has 31 Wilderness Brigade members and 9 Ellwood Legacy members.

In 2015 the Heritage Program Committee is looking to increase membership and will be co-ordinating with the Membership and Communications Committees, along with Outreach.

FoWB BOARD of DIRECTOR'S BIOGRAPHIES Continuing Board Members

Nate Bond (2015) Committee: Ellwood Interpreter

Nate was born in Indianapolis,Indiana and holds undergraduate degrees from Purdue and Indiana Universities. He came to Virginia in 1967 to work at the then Naval Weapons Laboratory in Dahlgren, transferred to the Naval Air Systems Command in 1981 and later retired after more than thirty-seven years of service.
